South America</b></li> <li>1. In 1810 Simon Bolivar a wealthy Creole officer led the move to independence. By 1822 he had won major victories and founded Gran Columbia.</li> <li>2. Eventually he became convinced that America was ungovernable. He died in 1830 committed to the idea of a republic.</li> <li><b>S. South America</b></li> <li>1. Jose' de San Martin pushed all the way into Peru for Independence. By 1825 Latin America was independent.</li> </ul>
